



Dual Nurse-Midwifery/Women's Health Nurse Practitioner Program

Provide primary, gynecologic, and reproductive healthcare to individuals across the lifespan

Berkley School of Nursing at Georgetown University (BSON) distance-based, online dual Nurse-Midwifery/Women's Health Nurse Practitioner (NM/WHNP) program prepares advanced practice registered nurses to provide: primary healthcare to individuals across the lifespan; reproductive healthcare during the pregnancy, labor, birth, and postpartum periods; sexual and gynecologic healthcare; family planning; preconception care; and care of newborns up to one month.

- Develop advanced clinical reasoning and decision-making skills during **live distance-based, online classes**, informed by interactive content and unfolding case studies.
- At in-person **Objective Clinical Intensives** (OCIs), practice interviewing and assessing with standardized patients and genitourinary teaching associates (GUTA) sessions, and develop specialized skills, such as performing pelvic exams and gynecologic procedures, through high fidelity simulation.
- Learn how to provide trauma informed, person-centered care.
- Engage in a curriculum that aims to advance health-equity, mitigate racism and biases, and provide structurally competent care.
- Care for individuals' gynecological and reproductive needs through **clinical placement experiences** supported by expert preceptors, clinical faculty advisors, and course faculty.

You will receive dedicated support and resources throughout the program, which include:

- BSON faculty, many of whom are Fellows in their specialty, who foster your professional growth and development
- Clinical placement specialists and advisors who partner with you to secure clinical sites
- Access to Georgetown library resources, student services, and the Hoya alumni network

After completing a Master of Science in Nursing (MS in Nursing), graduates are eligible to sit for the American Midwifery Certification Board (AMCB) exam and the National Credentialing Corporation (NCC) becoming certified as both nurse-midwives (CNMs) and women's health nurse practitioners (WHNPs). The following reflects first-time pass rates of MS in Nursing students who graduated in 2024.

98% 1-year AMCB certification / 81%

90% NCC first-pass rate* for 2024

Admissions and Application Requirements

Eligible candidates for the master's-level NM/WHNP program must:

- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- Have a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) or Clinical Nurse Leader (CNL) entry-level Master of Science in Nursing degree from a CCNE- or ACEN-accredited program
- Hold a current U.S. registered nurse (RN) license
- Have a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA and a 3.0 science GPA
- Have successfully completed (C or better) a college-level, three-credit course in statistics

Your application will include:

- Professional resume or curriculum vitae
- Sealed official academic transcripts
- A one- to two-page personal statement
- A live recorded interview
- Two letters of recommendation
- The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or International English Language Testing System (IELTS) if your native language is not English.

Deadlines for Admission

The Master of Science degree in Nursing program offers two cohorts per year. Georgetown University accepts applications on a rolling basis up to the final application deadline for each cohort.
